ARTWORK FROM LEICESTER CHILDREN FEATURE AT THIS YEAR'S BRITISH SCIENCE FESTIVAL



Young people from New Parks Adventure Playground have created visual artworks to showcase their perspective on the impact of temporary accommodation on health and wellbeing, as part of the 2022 British Science Festival.

The CHAMPIONS project (Children in Homeless Accommodations Managing Pandemic Invisibility Or Non-inclusive Strategies), is led by University College London (UCL) in collaboration with De Montfort University, Graffworks, Bee Squad, Unique Windows, Matt Black Photography, Sound Voice and Inspire Chorley Youth Zones.

The CHAMPIONS project has curated mixed media artwork and creative pieces (drawings, poems, photographs, ceramics, and videos) that go hand in hand with research findings from the project, including data and quotes from families in temporary accommodation to create a first-of-

its-kind exhibition.

Professor Monica Lakhanpaul (UCL Great Ormond Street Institute of Child Health), who led the research, said: "There are more than 210,000 children in temporary accommodation (TA) or sofa surfing in England and it is anticipated to rise with the cost-of-living crisis that we are now facing.

"The impact on children of not having a home is often the greatest, affecting their physical and mental health, as well as their education, safety, and life chances.

"The CHAMPIONS project wants to make sure children in TA are given a voice and that they are not forgotten."
